Reminder: Waste Discharge to Septic Systems Prohibited

As a reminder, discharging dental wastewater to onsite systems, such as septic tanks, is prohibited, according to the Michigan Department of Environmental Quality.

Wastewater from dental procedures is not considered sanitary wastewater pursuant to Part 22 of the Michigan Department of Environmental Quality Rules. On-site systems are not considered to be an acceptable method of disposal for medical waste pursuant to Part 138 of the Public Health Code.

Onsite systems include septic tank/leach fields, filtration systems, and mound systems. Wastewater discharged from an amalgam separator is not considered sanitary sewage

and therefore is unacceptable for discharge to an onsite wastewater system (Part 138 in the Public Health Code). This means that even if a dental facility currently has an amalgam separator and discharges into a septic system, there is still medical and hazardous waste passing through these separators, as they only target suspended solids.

Dental offices using these systems should be aware that wastewater discharge is prohibited and could subject these offices to expensive remediation costs to remove mercury from soil.

An isolated holding tank or amalgam containment system can be used to avoid unauthorized discharge of

wastewater into the environment. The MDA is aware of one company, Anterior Quest, based in Jenison, Mich., that provides these services, collecting all chairside dental waste and recycling it into mercury-free clean water. According to Anterior Quest, the system's costs are in line with other amalgam separator options and exempt any dental facility from Michigan and EPA federal regulations.
